

Rural School Children's Patriotic Fund

In 1916 the teachers and school children served lunches and sold patriotic buttons at the Rural School Fairs of Lennox and Addington, and raised the sum of \$321.87. This was the largest sum raised in any one County in Ontario, and was almost twice as large as the next two leading counties. The children and teachers of Lennox and Addington County should be very proud of this record.

The total amount of money raised by the school children of Ontario, in 44 counties, was \$3518.41. The expenses of buttons, trays, etc., was \$829.14, leaving a balance of \$2689.27. With this sum a special automobile is being built which will be used to transport returned wounded soldiers from the hospitals to the Re-educational classes being carried on at Toronto University.

In 1915 nearly \$2000.00 was collected, and a motor ambulance was purchased and sent to France.

This season the children and teachers will be asked to co-operate to again sell patriotic buttons, and help to raise money for a similar purpose.

Each one is asked to help.

RULES

READ VERY CAREFULLY

1. Competition for the following prizes is open only to the pupils of the Rural Schools in Kaladar, Anglesea and Effingham Township.

2. All pupils who received seeds or eggs from the School in the Spring of 1917 may exhibit in Classes 1 to 12 and 19.

3. Children who received seeds or eggs from the School in 1916 or 1915 may exhibit their produce in Special Classes 13 to 18 and 20 and 21, even though they may have passed the Entrance in 1916 or 1917.

4. Live Stock can only be shown by boys who made their entries with the teacher before the summer holidays, and have fed, cared for, and trained their stock for exhibition during the summer. Boys who have just passed their Entrance are eligible to show their Live Stock.

5. Pupils who have passed their Entrance cannot enter the Classes 30 to 56.

6. All exhibits of Grain, Potatoes, Roots and Chickens in Classes 1 to 21 must be the product of seeds or eggs supplied by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

7. All exhibits must be the work or the property of the exhibitor.

8. All articles in the Girls' Section must be made by the pupil who will sign her name under the recipe of cooking.

9. No entry fee will be charged for any exhibit.

10. All entries for exhibition should be made to the School Representative not later than Sept. 7th, 1917.

11. The Entry Tickets must be filled out with the Class, Section, Description; Pupil's Name, Age; Township, School Section Number.

12. The Entry Tickets must be securely tied or fastened to each exhibit before bringing it to the Fair.

13. All articles for exhibition must be in place not later than 11 o'clock, as judging will commence at 12 o'clock.

14. Exhibits must not be removed before 4 o'clock.

15. Admission: Free to all.

Sports and Races

Programme

100 yards dash for boys, 12 years and over.

Potato race for girls.

50 yards dash for boys, 9 years and over.

100 yards dash for girls, 12 years and over.

Sack race for boys. (Bring your own sack).

50 yards dash for girls, 9 years and over.

25 yards dash for boys, under 9 years.

Soda biscuit race for girls, run 20 yards, eat a soda biscuit, drink a glass of water, and run back.

Three legged race for boys.

25 yards dash for girls under 9 years.

Wheelbarrow race for boys, 25 yards, change at end.

Needle and thread race for girls, run 20 yards, thread needle and run back. (Bring your own needle and thread).

Boot and shoe race for boys, run 50 yards, put shoes on and run back, laced shoes only.
