Cloyne & District Historical Society General Meeting Minutes

May 20th, 2024

- 1: Call to Order- President Ken Hook called the meeting to order at 1:02 p.m.
- 2. O' Canada and Moment of Silence
- 3. First Nations Land Acknowledgement-Ken Hook
- 4. Approval of the Agenda- Motion for approval of the Agenda by Doc Ruth and seconded by Cindy Austin. Motion carried.
- 5. Presentations
 - Tammy Whitelock The Big Chair update (Tammy did not make it to the meeting)
 - b. Teri Woods The Kindness Garden

The Kindness Garden is a community project spearheaded by Terri Woods. Terri described many current projects she is involved with locally. Description of the Kindness Rock Garden- A garden consisting of wood, mulch, and hand-painted rocks, which can be taken from the garden, replaced by other hand-painted rocks, and shared with others in a network of kindness. The project participants will work with students who will paint these rocks (generously donated by Nowell Construction.) Children can place their rocks in the garden (hopefully at or near the Museum opening date). The hope is that Museum visitors will participate, and local clubs and associations will have rock painting sessions. Once the first garden is established, there is hope that it will expand to other municipalities as an attraction. (Halls, libraries etc.) A sign will be associated with the garden to indicate the exchange process. The municipality of North Frontenac has approved this project. There was a short discussion surrounding suggestions of the possible location by the group. (Sixty dollars for three is the cost of the garden materials) They are hoping for a start date before the end of school (June 27). Ian suggested that a good location around the memorial trees would be a good location. No firm decision was made.

c. Eileen Flieler – The Heritage Wall

Eileen states that they are still waiting for price estimates so there is nothing more to report regarding the wall.

d. Bus Tour to Ameliasburgh Heritage Village, Fri, June 14, 8:30 to 4:30 Eileen Flieler and Nawar Hage- It had been determined that an earlier time to depart would allow for more time at the village. Slides were shown of the Heritage Village grounds and the village layout. The day's agenda was displayed for the group, i.e.: Meet at 8:15, bring what beverage you want for your consumption on the trip, 10 a.m. arrival at the museum, admission is free, but donations

are welcome, leave the museum at 1 p.m. for the Gateway Restaurant where a particular room is booked which holds 35 people. (Overflow will dine in the main restaurant.) The restaurant at 1:30, leaving the restaurant at 3 p.m., arrival at Barrie Hall at 4:30.

Patrons are to pay for food and drinks. A menu for the restaurant was distributed. The bus cost is \$20 per person. The trip is open to members and nonmembers alike. The bus holds 44. Carolyn asked about posters, but the consensus was that it should not be necessary to advertise the trip. It was suggested that we "pass the hat" for a tip for the driver, and all agreed. The bus is a school bus from Martin's bus line.

- a. Museum Opening The June 22nd program is still being revised. Indigenous garden celebration the same day and time as the museum opening. The "Strawberry Bloom" opening ceremony to recognize the reason for the creation of the garden and appreciation of people in the community who made it possible was discussed by Rosemary Teed. The garden will feature the four indigenous sacred plants tobacco, sage, cedar and sweetgrass. A sign will signify the plants and the teachings they represent. An Elder from Sharbot Lake to do the smudge ceremony at 11 a.m. (this necessitates the delay of the BBQ until after the smudge ceremony). People will mingle in the museum and tour the gardens. Pickled Chicken String Band will be playing in the museum on opening day.
- b. Speakers' Forum The next speaker Rand Simon, Former NHL agent, on May 22 at 7 pm. Nawar Hage is asking to extend the research forum to more people in the community in order to increase suggestions regarding new speakers.
